History

They were told some of the early settlers arrived here by boat and others travelled on the railroad that runs through the middle of town. Why they chose this area to build a town is still a bit of a mystery.

The Name Shady Pines

When you ask how the town got its name you're told, "Just look around you." Sure enough, big 'ole clusters of long leaf pine trees are everywhere. Those trees are all along Main Street downtown. People sit on benches in their shade and children pick up



pinecones for school projects. One day, a fella visiting the town for the first time declared, "These are some really shady pines!" And that's how the town got its name.

Macaw River

There are competing theories on how the river got its name. The one you hear most often is that a couple of Macaw birds escaped from a zoo many miles away. Those flying critters followed the river and were first seen by early Shady Pines settlers perched in the trees near the river. The other theory is that the river got its name from a hometown hero named Burt Macaw. Burt was a big man with a big personality who loved to fly fish in the river. He became something of a legend



when he rescued a young boy from certain drowning in the waters of the racing river. Some say the river was named after Burt, but no one knows for sure.

Stonewall Park

Here again, there are two versions of how the park with its signature gazebo got its name. Some folks will tell you it's named from the stacked stone wall that runs all along the edges of the park. Others will tell you it was named for the Civil War general, Stonewall Jackson. In Shady Pines it's hard to get a straight answer.

One thing's for sure, between the signature white gazebo smack in the middle of the park, the carousel with its colorful horses going up and down to music, the swings and slides, the nearby lake for sailing and swimming and the neighboring Dog Park, Stonewall Park is the place to have a lot of fun!



Boomer and Halley Book Series




Meet the Sanders
